

Sixteen months down, twenty-six issues out, fourteen podcast episodes up, and one Greensheet in the dirt. The ground of EtCetera has shifted in my time as Senior Editor, and my feet haven't always kept up. The first order of business, looking back at this time, is to thank the Regent College community for being patient with me as I struggled to find that ever-shrinking balanced place between progress and tradition.

I did a lot of things wrong in my time with EtCetera.

I thought that everyone at Regent would have the same interest in 80's punk zine aesthetics as me - and that was my bad (but hey, no such thing as bad publicity...).

The EtCetera podcast began as an experiment to see if anyone wanted to hear any more of my voice than they were already subjected to ... My experiment revealed that they didn't, and that was my mistake, but what people did want was a platform to hear, learn, and experience each other's stories. I have pushed the podcast in that direction, as far away from myself as possible, but it is still a work in progress (if you haven't listened to it in a while, I would humbly ask for a second chance at your attention - there are some wonderful things that the community has shared on the podcast in the last little while).

But I am trying to not focus too much on my mistakes with EtCetera..

When I look back through the EtCetera archives, I realize that this paper has never belonged to me, and nothing that I have done with EtCetera is permanent. Regent students have been submitting content to EtCetera for longer than I have even been alive, and any attentive eye will quickly see that students in 1994 had many of the same things on their mind as us here in 2023. The early pages of EtCetera were filled with theology jokes, reflections on community and friendship, tips on how to handle Vancouver's rain...etc.

And just like I cannot part the Vancouver rain clouds, I cannot turn EtCetera into anything that the Regent community will not sustain. This is both the greatest joy and greatest frustration that my position has brought.

It has been a frustration, at times, because my deadline does not depend on how many submissions EtCetera has received. I have released a paper every two weeks of the term, even if my inbox has gotten one submission (or even less) for me to work with (this has been the case more often than you might expect). In this sense, I have been at the mercy of the community for the release of every issue.

But this reliance on the community has also been my respite. I can put as large of a "Dryden" stamp on this production as I wish, for good or for ill, and the next editor, along with the next generation of Regent, can undo everything I have done. The future is unwritten.

But I have a background in existentialism - the precedence of EtCetera's existence over its essence is not a source of despair for me - it has rather been an invitation into the absurd. I have been free to experiment, because the next editor will be free to undo all that I have done. I have thrown some spaghetti at the wall, and the next editor will take what has stuck.

When I put the Greensheet to its timely death, I was experimenting again. This one seems to have not been a mistake. But who am I to erase 50% of EtCetera's three-decade history in one fell swoop? The decision felt almost too big for me, and yet I made it happen. Thank goodness the future, as we know, holds the possibility of both death and resurrection - the future of Regent may hold a few Greensheets yet, or it may not (just as long as I don't have to be the one to type them up...).

And this is the state in which EtCetera finds itself. As an entity that belongs not to the Editor or to any contributor alone, but to the community. The community has always decided what EtCetera has looked like, and though this will sometimes frustrate any lone Editor, it is also my source of confidence in the ture of EtCetera. I have only been a steward - the future of EtCetera is ours, not mine.

And so, like Kierkegaard's knight of faith, I will throw EtCetera into the abyss of Regent - the abyss of poets, theologians, philosophers, comedians, artists, and all the other weirdos that make this community what it is - and though it is an abyss, "I believe, nevertheless" that it will be sustained.



Amelia Hamiter: "Hard to say but it probably involved Daniel Choi."


Will Chu: "Me walking into the library as if it's the atrium."
